Town of Highland Beach Notice of General Election

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the Town of Highland Beach will hold its General Election on Tuesday, March 11, 2025, for the purpose of electing one (1) Commissioner for a three-year term, ending March 2028. To be eligible for election as Commissioner, a person must be a citizen of the United States, reside within the corporate limits of the town, and a qualified elector of the Town of Highland Beach, State of Florida registered in Precinct 2801 for a period of not less than one (1) year immediately preceding the beginning of the qualification period.

Each person seeking to qualify for election to the office of Commissioner as a candidate must file the required qualification papers and pay a qualifying fee with the Town Clerk during the qualifying period, which begins at noon on Tuesday, November 12, 2024 and ends at noon on Tuesday, November 26, 2024.

Understanding and Preventing Falls in Older Adults

Falls pose a significant health risk for older adults, often resulting in serious injuries or even death. By analyzing the data and adopting targeted prevention strategies, we can reduce fall risks and enhance the quality of life for older adults. For adults aged 65 and older, falls are the most common cause of injury. Each year, over 14 million older adults experience a fall, equating to roughly one in four in this age group. These incidents lead to nearly 3 million emergency department visits and 1 million hospital admissions annually. The impacts of falls can be devastating, including fractures, head trauma, and a loss of independence. In Highland Beach, falls represent 35% of all 911 calls for emergency medical assistance. In Palm Beach County, falls account for approximately 45% of all emergency medical calls annually. Several factors elevate the likelihood of falls in older adults:

- Muscle Weakness in the Lower Body
- Problems with Walking or Balance
- Use of Certain Medications (e.g., tranquilizers, sedatives, antidepressants)
- Visual Impairments
- Foot Pain or Inappropriate Footwear
- Hazards in the Home Environment (e.g., broken steps, unsecured rugs, clutter)

The presence of multiple risk factors further raises the chance of falling.



Strategies for Fall Prevention

Effective fall prevention involves a combination of medical, environmental, and lifestyle interventions:

1. **Exercise Programs:** Activities that improve strength and balance, such as Tai Chi, can greatly reduce fall risk.
2. **Medication Review:** Regular medication evaluations with a healthcare provider can help identify medications that may increase the risk of falls.
3. **Regular Vision Checks:** Ensuring vision prescriptions are current and addressing vision problems can help prevent falls.
4. **Home Safety Modifications:** Simple changes, such as removing tripping hazards, installing grab bars, and improving lighting, can make homes safer.
5. **Vitamin D Supplementation:** Maintaining adequate vitamin D levels supports bone health and muscle function.

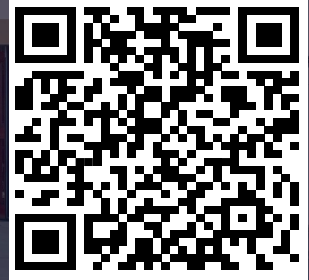

Understanding Flood Zones in Highland Beach: What You Need to Know About Recent FEMA Updates

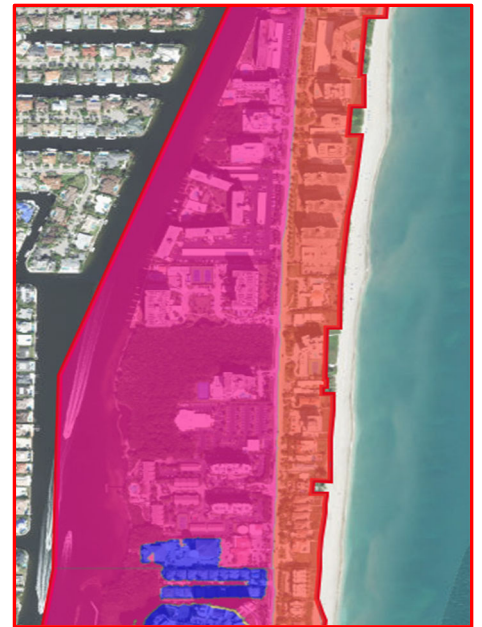
As many of you may know, FEMA recently updated the Flood Insurance Rate Maps (FIRMs) for Highland Beach, bringing significant changes to how flood risks are categorized in our town. Whether you're a new homeowner or a long-time resident, understanding your flood zone and the implications of these updates is essential for protecting your property and ensuring compliance with the latest regulations.

What Are FIRMs and Why Are They Important?

FIRMs, or Flood Insurance Rate Maps, are the official maps used by FEMA to designate areas at different levels of flood risk. These maps are crucial for determining flood insurance requirements and establishing building regulations in areas vulnerable to flooding. For Highland Beach, these updates reflect new data on storm surge, sea level rise, and other environmental factors affecting our coastal community.

Access the Interactive Flood Information Portal

Highland Beach residents can now easily access their property's flood zone information through the **Interactive Flood Information Portal**, available on the town's website at www.highlandbeach.us or by following the links in this article. The portal is powered by Forerunner floodplain management software and provides free, detailed information about flood zones, Base Flood Elevation (BFE), and how the latest FEMA updates impact individual properties. Simply type in your address to get started.



Highland Beach Flood Zones: AE and VE

AE Zone: located primarily on the west side of A1A (Ocean Blvd)

- This zone generally has lower flood risk than the **VE zone**, but it's still crucial to comply with town regulations, especially since some properties in the AE zone have a higher Base Flood Elevation (BFE) than others. Most of the AE zone has a BFE of **7' NAVD**, though some areas have a BFE of **8' NAVD**.

VE Zone: includes oceanfront properties.

- This zone is more restrictive due to the risk of wave action, typically has a BFE of **12' NAVD**, though certain properties in this zone now have a BFE of **13' NAVD**. These higher

elevations are critical to ensuring oceanfront homes are protected from both storm surge and wave impact.

What Is NAVD and BFE?

BFE, or Base Flood Elevation, is the expected height of floodwaters during a 1% annual chance flood. In simpler terms, it's the height above sea level where flooding could occur.

NAVD, or the **North American Vertical Datum of 1988**, is the reference point used to measure these elevations. For BFE purposes, **0 NAVD** is essentially the average sea level height, and the BFE indicates how much higher or lower a structure must be to avoid flood risk.

Key Changes to the FEMA Maps

The recent FIRM updates have reclassified some properties into higher or lower flood risk categories. Notably, the Base Flood Elevation (BFE) has risen for much of the island:

- In the AE zone, most properties have seen an increase from **6' NAVD** to **7' NAVD**, though some are now at **8' NAVD**.
- In the VE zone, BFEs have increased by 2 feet, with many properties now at **12' NAVD** and some at **13' NAVD**.

These updates may affect your flood insurance requirements, and any future construction or renovations will need to meet the new BFE standards to comply with town codes.

What Does This Mean for Homeowners?

If your property has been reclassified into a higher-risk zone, you may now be required to carry flood insurance if you hold a mortgage. Even if your home is in the X500 zone (outside the Special Flood Hazard Area), it's wise to consider flood insurance as an extra precaution. Properties in higher BFE areas will also need to follow stricter building requirements to ensure structures are elevated above potential flood levels.

Code Tip of the Month: Temporary Signs

Highland Beach Ordinance 23-9(e) prohibits the placement of temporary signs, other than government signs displaying government messages, on public property and public rights of way. The public right of way is typically defined as 50ft on either side of the crown of the road (highest point) along A1A and 25ft on either side of the road for all other streets within the town. This means any temporary sign, including real estate signs, political signs or any other free speech signs, must be placed on the private property of the resident or homeowner. This reduces the visual clutter along the roadway and removes additional distractions for drivers, bicyclist and pedestrians.

For any temporary signs placed in the right of way, the town may issue a Notice of Violation, or the signs may be removed by the town and will be disposed of. If you are wanting to put a temporary sign on your property, but you are not sure where your property line ends and where the right of way starts, you can check the Palm Beach Property Appraiser website to get an idea of where the right of way is. You can also check where your utilities are placed, as these are typically in the right of way and of course you may always check with the Town's Code Compliance Department at 561-278-4540 and they can advise you of acceptable locations to place your temporary signs.

BEACHFRONT PROPERTY OWNERS, SEE HOW YOUR PROPERTY IS AFFECTED!

Dear Resident:

In 2023, the Town commissioned a Beach Restoration Feasibility Study ("Study"). This Study includes a Beachfront Property Evaluation ("Evaluation") which provides beach and dune observations and corresponding recommendations for ALL beachfront properties in the Town. In an effort to bring awareness to this important Evaluation, below is information on how to access the Evaluation as well as information on the upcoming Evaluation resident outreach event.

Here's how to access the Beachfront Property Evaluation:

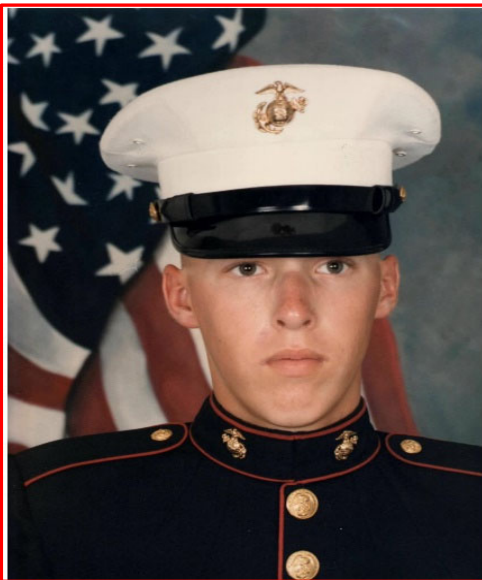

OUR MARINE IN KUWAIT, DESERT STORM

In a continuing effort to recognize those Veterans who live in Highland Beach or serve our community, we share a short story of each and post it on our town website: www.highlandbeach.us and specifically [Veteran Heroes of Highland Beach | Highland Beach, FL](#). Please visit this tab to read stories and profiles of our citizens who have served or are serving our country and our town.

Prepare to be amazed by the incredible stories of our Veterans. We have at least one Brigadier General, one who was captured by the Germans and escaped three times during the Battle of the Bulge, a WWII B-17 navigator, and other veterans who served in Desert Shield, Desert Storm, and Vietnam, along with others across Army, Navy, Marines, and Air Force – including a fighter pilot who trained other fighter pilots. Others served in different roles from scout dog handler to nurse, helicopter pilot to artillery Forward Observer. Some stories are quite dramatic, others very demanding and less dramatic. **But all, without exception, served with the utmost honor and dedication, for which we are deeply grateful.**



This story is about Dave Skrabec, who was born in Cleveland, OH, but his family moved to Boca Raton when his Dad was transferred from Cleveland by Eltech Corp in 1983. He and his younger sister, Susan, went to school in Boca at Spanish River High School when it first opened as a brand-new facility. But Dave did not like school, and he decided to join the U.S. Marines for four years against his parents' wishes, who wanted him to go to college. So, he signed up at the ripe old age of 17 to be a Marine, a decision that would lead to personal sacrifices and a deep sense of duty.

After graduating from High School in 1987, he went off to basic training at Parris Island, S.C. Although he signed up for infantry, with the wisdom and judgment of an experienced Marine sergeant, he was directed to train in artillery and naval gunfire as a forward observer. His role as an "FO" was to land with the Marines and provide fire support from guns on ships or the Marine's ground-based artillery like the M777 Howitzer.

Dave's artillery training was extensive at Fort Sill, Oklahoma, for several months before being assigned to Naval Gunfire training as an FO at Little Creek Naval Base, VA, now known as the Joint Expeditionary Naval Base Little Creek.

From 1988 to 1991, Dave was assigned to Okinawa, Japan, and then temporarily deployed to South Korea, Thailand, the Philippines, and other Southeast Asian regions. Much of this was operational training with multiple international forces for combined arms maneuvers.



Then, war broke out with Saddam invading Kuwait. General Schwarzkopf assembled land, sea, and air forces for a combined arms invasion of Iraq. The operation was called Desert Storm. During the lead-up to the invasion, there was great concern that the war would result in U.S. casualties by the thousands.

Corporal Skrabec was involved in the invasion force which moved quickly over the desert outside Kuwait City toward Iraq. He witnessed what remained of the destruction to Kuwait City and of Iraqi forces fleeing north to escape the American forces. He was amazed at the magnitude of the US forces – hundreds of military tanks, personnel carriers, and the like, and how fast everything moved in the race to Baghdad. Dave was incredulous at the thousands of Iraqi soldiers who were taken prisoner, with many starving or suffering from dehydration.

Allied forces had been bombing the Iraqi Army for weeks and were decimated before US land forces attacked. The war was over in **43 days**, from Jan. 17 to Feb. 28, 1991, and Dave was back in Okinawa with the 2nd Battalion, 12th Marines, 3rd Marine Division.



Dave returned from Okinawa to the U.S. and was honorably discharged from the Marines in August 1991. Reflecting on that fact, he volunteered a strong personal feeling that the Marines greatly impacted him. In fact, he said that he would not be here as a Police Officer if it weren't for his time in the Marines. It was a great experience that came at the right time and helped shape the rest of his life.

In February 1992, Dave became a police officer for the City of Boca Raton, the Boca PD. He worked for years at Boca PD doing everything from patrol duty to SWAT assignments to Motorcycle duty. Officer Skrabec retired from Boca PD after 25 years in 2017.

Along the way, Dave married Jessica in 2002 and later had two children: Dave Jr., who is 17, and Joseph, who is 16. They both attend Boca High School. Dave Jr. is a senior considering a nursing career and plans to attend college locally. Joseph is a sophomore in high school.

When Dave retired from Boca PD, he took a position as Head of Security at Spanish River Christian School in Boca. His wife works at Spanish River Christian Church. Over time, Dave was itching for a change. In 2018, he began working part-time for Highland Beach Police as a reserve officer.

In June 2023, Officer Skrabec went full-time as a Highland Beach Police Officer and, by October, was promoted to Acting Sergeant. In April 2024, he was made a full-time Sergeant on the team.



Today, Officer Skrabec lives close by in Boca with his wife, Jessica, his two sons, and his father, Dave. Officer Skrabec's mother, Patricia, passed away in 2015.

With this background, he was enthusiastic about this "hidden gem" called Highland Beach. It is incredibly friendly and wonderful to work here.
